The community first responders attend 999 medical emergency calls within their local area to give potentially life-saving treatment prior to the arrival of the ambulance. Volunteer car drivers help patients with hospital transport and volunteer chaplins provide spiritual support for patients and EEAST staff. Generous donations and grants help to provide uniform, various training aids, and equipment including life-saving defibrillators.

Dedicated staff



The corporate trustee agreed a new three year strategy in March 2023, providing a clear direction for charity growth and development, enhancing our impact to patient care in the east of England.

Pre-COVID the charity remained underdeveloped but in recent years the charity has received increased income and additional support from NHS Charities Together, the overarching membership body for NHS charities.

This supports projects and initiatives which are over and above those funded by core NHS budgets.

This support tool, costing £8,000, was launched in 2021 and has been continued to be fully funded by the charity.

Supporting

dedicated staff

Thanks to you, during COVID, we were able to fund wellbeing gardens that have become a place of calm for EEAST frontline ambulance staff at a time of unprecedented unrest. The charity has continued funding the creation of numerous wellbeing gardens across the Trust. At our ambulance stations we have created enriching outdoor spaces with planters, benches, gazebos and foliage.





"I've taken time out there on several occasions, mostly on night shift meal breaks. It's just such a calm space to relax and take time away from the busy communal areas on station. We're so lucky to have this space!"

Your donations have also funded the revamping of tired break out rooms with plants, pictures and recreational items, all to provide EEAST staff and volunteers with a more mindful area for relaxation and to improve wellbeing.



Welfare wagons

Thanks to your help all the refreshments on the welfare wagons are funded. The welfare wagons travel around the region supporting crews during times of increased pressure with limited or no access to drinks or snacks. On board these vital resources, there is often a clinician who is able to discuss difficult calls the crews may have been to.

Our 999 call handlers are also supported through the use of treat trolleys



Enhancing colleague to colleague support

Trauma Incident Management (TRiM) is crucial in the emergency services. Your support has funded two additional TRiM courses at a cost of £7,568, thanks to a NHS Charities Together grant. 14 new foundation practitioners for Essex and 18 for Norfolk are now available to offer additional help, increasing the number of trained TRiM practitioners able to assist staff following trauma exposure.

Supporting

local communities

In November 2022, EEAST launched the innovative EEAST Heart community education programme in partnership with the East of England Ambulance Service Charity.

This new scheme, led by the Trust community response team, will deliver potentially life-saving training sessions to the local communities in basic life support and AED awareness. At the end of March 2023, over 80 volunteers have supported this initiative by signing up to 'Train the Trainer' sessions ready to deliver the program to the public.

Potentially life-saving replacement pads for iPAD automated external defibrillators (AED) have been purchased at a cost of £18,894.

The AEDs were originally placed in the community as part of a Trust initiative to improve response times to cardiac arrests in the hard-to-reach areas of our region.

This funding has ensured that the devices remain fit for purpose and can continue to be used to support patients.



Unmet needs navigators and falls project

Working with NHS Charities Together

The innovative NHS
Charities Together
project grants
awarded last financial
year are fully underway focusing on
patient care.

The unmet needs pilot now has two full-time unmet needs navigators in post helping to signpost patients who have additional non-clinical needs to access community and social support services beyond what the ambulance and NHS can immediately offer.

This two year programme went live in October 2022 after the charity received a grant of £116,624 from NHS Charities Together.
Within six months of the scheme launching, a significant milestone was reached helping over 500 patients with issues that have come to light following a 999 call and a conversation with EEAST ambulance staff and volunteers who can use this new referral pathway. They and their families have already been signposted to community support with great feedback.

The second project provided falls equipment, training and on-going annual re-certification for volunteers within 18 targeted community first responder groups.

In addition to this, the fund paid for six new community first responder (CFR) roving cars, all fully equipped with falls and response kits and fully trained falls volunteers. This is providing a mobile resource within



communities to allow us to attend patients in a much wider geographic area, along with the opportunity for mentor support and CFR group collaboration.

These invaluable schemes help volunteers support patients in their communities who have fallen, potentially enabling patients to remain at home, without the need to attend hospital. Falls volunteers are also trained in providing access for patients to local support services and care pathways, linking them to the right resources to limit future falls and possible injury.

The charity was also successful in securing a £30,000 grant during the year from NHS Charities Together to support its development. A programme of work supported by this grant is planned.

New year, new look

Excitingly 2022/23 has been another progressive year for the charity, seeing the launch of our new logo to promote and raise awareness of the increasing impact of our work across the region.



Having a recognisable, separate brand is essential in raising awareness of the charity, both for our people and wider communities. It opens up additional opportunities to expand the support we can give to make a positive difference across our region.

Incredible supporters

The East of England Ambulance Service Charity relies solely on donations and fundraising activities from our incredible supporters, generosity from legacies and income opportunities from grant programmes to truly make a difference to the lives of EEAST staff, volunteers and communities.



This year with the help of the fundraising campaign 'Outrun an Ambulance', as part of a wider collaboration of six ambulance services across the nation, we were proud winners of two national awards recognising the success of the collaboration and campaign.

During the year, there have been some amazing fundraising efforts, including from our dedicated community first responder groups. 
